

# Supporting effective feedback

#### Overview

Research shows that effective feedback is an important way of supporting the learning process. This CPD task seeks to support practitioners by helping them to understand some key principles of effective feedback practices and how these might be applied.

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### Introduction

In your role you may need to give learners feedback to support their learning. Do you ever think about how you might structure this feedback so as to maximise their progress?

Providing effective feedback and supporting learners with their understanding of the feedback given by others is known to be a highly effective way of supporting learners in their progression.

This CPD will help you understand some of the research that has been undertaken in this field and highlight some of the most effective strategies that can be utilised. It is intended to help you to reflect on current practices and show you ways that you can help to support effective feedback.

- To understand some of the research and theory regarding effective feedback
- To think about some strategies that can support effective feedback
- To reflect on ways to incorporate strategies into practice

# Task 1: Understanding some of the research associated with effective feedback

This task will help you to understand some of the thinking and research behind what helps children to progress. Professor Dylan Wiliam explains some of the research that has been undertaken regarding effective feedback.

### What is effective feedback?

Think about these questions and make some notes:

- What does Professor Wiliam say about effective feedback?
- How does he define these key terms; ego involving, task involving? Can you think of an example of each?
- Which of these is the most effective according to Professor Wiliam?
- What does Professor Wiliam say about the conditions for effective feedback?
- According to Professor Wiliam, "good feedback causes thinking" what do you think this means?

### Task 2: What should effective feedback focus on?

In this next clip, Professor Wiliam explains some feedback strategies which support learner progress.

Now think about these questions and make some notes:

- Professor Wiliam talks about the fact that comments can be more effective than grades for learners. Why could comments also not be helpful? Can you think of any instances yourself?
- What does Professor Wiliam mean when he states too much feedback is backward looking? Why is this a problem?
- What does he suggest feedback should focus on?
- Can you think of some examples of how feedback could achieve this?

Now that some of the theory and strategies that support effective feedback has been examined, think about how these might support the practice.
